WAM Featured on *Antiques Roadshow*

The hit PBS series, *Antiques Roadshow*, will pay a special visit to the Wichita Art Museum in July. *Antiques Roadshow* appraiser Arlie Sulka will be discussing four of WAM's Carder-era colored Steuben glass pieces in the "featured works" portion of the show. Sulka has spent more than 30 years in the art world and has been a specialist in glass—Tiffany in particular—on the series for nine years. Chief Curator Stephen

Gleissner says he's honored the Wichita Art Museum's glass is receiving such publicity. "Being featured on *Antiques Roadshow* is a sign of the national attention that our Steuben collection is receiving," says Gleissner.

The Wichita Art Museum has the second largest museum collection of Steuben glass in the country. The collection boasts close to 100 works, which among museums is second only to the Corning Museum in Corning, New York.
