

CAMEO GLASS

Earlier this year Reflecting Antiquity: Modern Glass Inspired by Ancient Rome, a thoughtful and thought-inspiring glass exhibition, was presented at the Corning Museum of Glass. This exhibition and the publication by the same title that accompanied it are the works of Dr. Karol Wight, curator of antiquities at the J. Paul Getty Museum, and Dr. David Whitehouse executive director of the Corning Museum of Glass.

One of the most fascinating and aweinspiring examples presented by Drs. Wight and Whitehouse is the unbelievably beautiful and technically outstanding examples of Cameo made by the Romans in the late first century B.C. and the early first century A.D.

A great many years later, Frederick Carder's life will be shaped in several ways by Cameo Glass and those who created in its rebirth in the nineteenth and twentieth centuries in England. Let me take a few minutes at this year's Carder Dinner to examine Frederick Carder and Cameo Glass. In the book, Reflecting Antiquity: Modern Glass Inspired by Ancient Rome, (P. 11), Dr. David Whitehouse gives us a good place from which to start as he defines what cameos are. Dr. Whitehouse says, Cameos are objects with two or more layers of different colors. The outer layer or layers are partly removed to create decoration in low relief on a background of contrasting color.


